SUBJECT: Report of Results of Regulatory Review

PURPOSE:

To share with the State Board the results of the Regulatory Review conducted by the Department of Title 13A. State Board of Education, Subtitles 13A.01-13A.06, Maryland Code of Regulations, and to request State Board authorization to submit these results in the Final Report to be prepared by the Department and submitted to the Joint Committee on Administrative, Executive, and Legislative Review and the Division of State Document on or before June 30, 2014.

BACKGROUND:

State Government Article, §§10-130—10-139, Annotated Code of Maryland requires that each State agency that adopts regulations must review those regulations every 8 years, unless exempt under §10-132.1. The purpose of the review is to determine whether the regulations are necessary for the public interest, continue to be supported by statutory authority and judicial opinion, or are appropriate for amendment or repeal.

The Maryland State Department of Education, in compliance with this article, submitted a plan in July 2013 to the Joint Committee on Administrative, Executive, and Legislative Review (AELR) to conduct such a review of the first subtitles of Title 13A, State Board of Education, Maryland Code of Regulations. The plan was approved by the AELR Committee in August 2013 and the Department proceeded to implement the review according to that plan. Notice was posted on the MSDE/State Board website and in Maryland Register notifying the public and stakeholders of the review and inviting comment. The initial review was conducted by Department staff with assigned responsibilities for the respective chapters of the subtitles. For each chapter, staff were asked to complete a review form (attached) as proscribed by the Division of State Documents.

While staff were completing their review of the regulations, invitations were sent out to a diverse group of stakeholder organizations inviting them to assist in the review and to designate representatives to serve on a Stakeholder Review Committee. All organizations and groups invited responded positively to the invitation by designating representatives (list attached). The results of the staff review of the regulations were sent out to the Stakeholder Review Committee in early February and the Committee met on March 10, 2014. All stakeholder groups with the exception of the Public School Superintendents Association of Maryland were represented at this meeting.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

The purpose of the regulatory review is to determine if the regulations included under these subtitles:

- Continue to be necessary for the public interest?
- Continue to be supported by statutory authority and judicial opinion?
- Are obsolete or otherwise appropriate for amendment or repeal?
- Are effective in accomplishing their intended purpose?

The initial review of subject regulations was completed by staff, many of whom conferred with colleagues in the local school systems. A few staff convened groups of local colleagues to review and discuss the regulations. Public comment on the regulatory review was closed at end of January 2014. The only comments received were on COMAR 13A.04.13 Program in Physical Education. Four groups submitted comments on this Program advocating adoption of the National Physical Education Standards and requiring at least 150 minutes of physical education each week in our schools.

The Stakeholder Review Committee met on March 10, 2014 to discuss and share comments on the review. All organizations, with the exception of the Public School Superintendents Association of Maryland (PSSAM), had representatives at this meeting. The Maryland Association of Boards of Education (MABE) was the only stakeholder group to submit written comments. For the most part, MABE agreed with the actions proposed by staff while offering helpful editorial comments or ideas to consider. MABE, in many instances, advocated that Department staff work with representatives of small, medium, and large school systems in drafting the required amendments to the regulations. The Stakeholder Review Committee was provided time at the meeting in March to again review each of the chapters and the staff recommendations along with the MABE comments. No additional changes were suggested by the Committee. A brief summary of the meeting along with the MABE comments were sent to the PSSAM representative following the Stakeholder meeting. No comments have been received from PSSAM.

ACTION:

The State Board of Education is asked to approve all recommendations of proposed actions related to the regulations that were the subject of this Regulatory Review (Attachment 3) and to authorize the Department to incorporate these actions into the Final Report of the Regulatory Review which the Department will submit to the Joint Committee on Administrative, Executive, and Legislative Review and the Division of State Document on or before June 30, 2014.
